Poorly managed dog populations

Uncontrolled dog populations build fear and contribute to inhumane culling

Poor physical welfare of dogs

Such as low body condition, skin conditions, low life expectancy, untreated injuries and disease

Human deaths from Rabies

It still causes c.59,000 human deaths every year, but Rabies is 100% preventable by vaccination



We'll motivate, train and encourage people in vet practices and shelters to offer all the services they can - particularly neutering and vaccination

We'll help people understand the benefits of neutering and vaccination. And we'll make sure people know how to spot harmful practices
