What is lobbying?





/idal/

verb

gerund or present participle: lobbying

seek to influence (a legislator) on an issue.

Tip 1: Politicians are people...and pet owners!



Tip 2: You are the expert



- Politicians work on lots of different issues so often it will be the first time they have heard much detail on your issue
- This means you are definitely the expert!
- You can offer real-life expertise, case studies or data from your organisation that they wouldn't be aware of otherwise



Tip 3: Do your research



Think about who to lobby

- Members of national parliament / assembly, senate or regional parliament
- National / regional / local Government departments
- EU policymakers



Tip 3: Do your research



...and scope for relevant interests. E.g. for Members of Parliament:

- Research key members of political parties
- Check Parliament website for
 - Membership of relevant committee(s)
 - Involvement in relevant debates
- Follow on social media
- Check who represents relevant constituencies
- Look out for personal interests (e.g. MPs with pets)

Tip 4: Keep an eye on key political developments



Timing is important!

- Big political issues can dominate parliamentary agendas or even mean that you can't lobby at certain times. For example, if an election is called. Other issues in recent times include Brexit, the COVID pandemic, the war in Ukraine and the cost-of-living crisis.
- Also important to e.g. monitor parliamentary questions, check for proposals for new legislation and monitor parliament committee activities to make sure you don't miss opportunities.

Tip 5: Take a collaborative approach



- Joining or forming an alliance with likeminded organisations to jointly campaign or meet with policymakers
- For example, the EU Dog & Cat Alliance is a network of over 90 dog and cat organisations coming together to lobby in the EU
- Politicians are more likely to take action if the same 'ask' is coming from more than one organisation





Tip 6: When communicating with politicians get key points in quickly





- Politicians are busy people and often split their time between their constituency/region and the relevant Parliament. They also work on many issues.
- When meeting with politicians, you may only get 30 mins to get your messages across so make the most of that time.
- Emails or briefings should be short and clear, with any asks clearly highlighted.

Tip 7: Plan multiple activities to keep up the pressure



- Meetings with individual policymakers (Government, Parliament, etc.)
- Do you have a rehoming centre? Invite your constituency's MP to visit!
- Campaigns targeting policymakers (e.g. on Twitter, via post or email)
- Asking politicians to sign an open letter to Government
- Holding an event (in-person or virtual) to engage with multiple politicians







Tip 8: it doesn't have to be expensive



- Virtual meetings are here to stay! Many politicians are happy to meet online and you can also hold virtual events.
- Most politicians are on social media and this can be a useful and cost effective way to engage with them.
- In the current climate, it is actually beneficial not to run expensive lobbying campaigns.



Tip 9: you can be creative – lobbying can be fun!





Tip 10: ALWAYS TAKE A PHOTO!



- Take a photo for them to share in a press release or on social media
- Elected politicians like to be able to show what they are doing in their constituency or region, or what they are doing for good causes.










