FAO guidelines to Dog Population Management, 2011



• "A number of challenges were identified for the successful implementation of reproduction control around the world, particularly in the developing world.

- lack of suitably trained staff
- poor techniques
- insufficient anaesthesia
- insufficiently sterilized instruments
- post-surgical complications
- "Dog owners and carers, too, often struggle to access or afford reproduction control services."



Trials and Tribulations



- WVS India International Training Center established in 2010
 - 12 days long residential program, focus on good quality spay-neuter hands-on skills
 - 10-12 participants at a time, 20-25 courses per year

 Initial challenge to overcome: How to get veterinarians understand the benefit of the program?





High surgical standards, post-op wound scoring

Specific focus on safe field anesthesia, multi-modal, pre-emptive analgesia

Asepsis, autoclave and instrument packing practice

Minimal. Publication and continuous feedback from the field

WVS ITC trained vets able to provide spay/neuter services in remote places
